Detailed course content and reasons for introduction of course.

Among the greatest questions that can be posed concerns our origins. The problem has occupied humans since antiquity but assumed a central stage in science when Darwin published the book 'The Descent of Man.' That this problems remains at the forefront in the brightest minds now maturing was evident during a recent visit from Chris Stringer, as an Origins Institute Public Lecturer, which generated enormous excitement on campus. This course will feed off that excitement, as students will be provided with an overview about human origins. Topics will be chosen and presented in a manner that overlaps minimally with ANTHROP 2E03 HUMAN VARIATION AND EVOLUTIONARY CHANGE, and ANTHROP 3N03 PRIMATE EVOLUTION.
